What do I need to do to join? First, you need to win your school election. Elections are being held in the district's secondary schools and Epping Forest College between 22 January and Friday 9 February 2018. school will have 2 Youth Council seats as well as 5 independent seats for candidates who either attend school or college outside the district, or are excluded from school, or being home educated or working. The election results will be announced live online on 27 March 2018.

You will be elected for a 2 year term and will be required to attend 2 evening meetings a month in Epping. 

Local Plan - Final Proposed Development Sites Revealed

You may recall from issue 88 of News & Views the sites that Residential Sites were proposed for housing development in the Epping Between 18th December 2017 and 29th Forest District. January 2018, Epping Forest District Council (EFDC) consulted on its Submission Version of the Local Plan, indentifying where it proposes new development should be located. I think most people would agree that new homes are needed, however the issue of where they should be sited remains a difficult and often contentious subject. EFDC is not proposing any development sites in either Toot Hill or Stanford Rivers, the closest allocation being around 590 homes in Ongar (see map and table for specific site details and allocations). Further large scale development is proposed for Epping (1,305 homes), North Weald (1,050 homes), Loughton (1,021 new homes) and around the periphery of Harlow (3,900 homes). A Local Plan doesn't only deal with housing development. It also addresses employment, the environment, transport and infrastructure, as well as creating policies that will guide development for the period of the plan - in our case up the year 2033.

So what happens next? The Plan goes before an Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State who reviews its content to ensure it meets the four tests of 'soundness', namely that the plan is Positively Prepared, Justified, Effective and Consistent with National Policy. inspector is happy, then this is the plan that will see us through to 2033. If not, he/she can suggest modifications, or even find the plan 'unsound'. The examination by the inspector is expected to take some time, and we are not expecting to hear much for probably next 8-10 months.

It's worth noting that the houses wouldn't all be built at the same time, but would be staggered over a number of years. For example the houses for Ongar are expected to be built between 2019 and 2026.

Sites ONG.R1 and ONG.R2 are identified as 'West Ongar Framework Plan Area'. EFDC states that it Concept recognises that in some cases the production of Concept Frameworks would provide a more proportionate and approach, whilst still ensuring comprehensive and cohesive approach is taken to the planning and delivery of development and infrastructure (how's that for a mouthful!). The Concept Framework will need to be created by landowners or developers of the site to ensure certain issues are addressed such as cycling, access, and infrastructure, which includes the need for any highway upgrades to the A414 Four Wantz junction.

For those of you who are wondering, there is no mention of changing the Epping Ongar Railway Heritage Line back into a commercial and operational underground link to London. However, there is talk of a possible opportunity to convert the disused line into a bus rapid transport line to North Weald Bassett and future extension to Ongar. What this means exactly is unclear. I guess it's a case of watch this space! It is also proposed that the Epping Underground Car Park would be used for housing, however the Local Plan makes it clear that no net loss of commuter parking should occur, with any development having to make alternative arrangements for such parking.

Recent reports of crime include a tractor theft in Berwick Lane some weeks ago, and a couple of farm buggies stolen in nearby Tawny Common. There were also reports of thefts from vehicles around London We have also seen reports of Key Jammers being used in the Loughton area so perhaps someone is chancing their luck on our patch. Key Jammers (as opposed to key scanners) work by blocking the locking signal as the owner leaves their car. The transmitters, which are easy to buy online, can be used to interrupt signals from keys fobs, meaning unwary motorists believe their cars to be secure when they're anything but. Relatively low-powered jammers can have a range of about 75m, meaning fairly large areas, such as a whole car park, can be affected at the same time,

however such crimes are not limited to car parks. The National Police Chiefs' Council state that they believe this is a growing feature of vehicle crime. Car owners could end up with a double sting, the theft itself (usually of contents) then the second sting being no insurance cover as there are no visible signs of forced entry. Ouch!

The only sure way to know your car is locked is to check manually. Most cars have another indication the lock has been deployed, such as the indicator lights flashing, wing mirrors drawing in, or the horn giving a short toot. If you're close enough to the car you can also hear the central locking clunk into place.

Keep a close watch on your car and possessions. Don't offer any incentives to criminals by manually checking that your vehicle is locked and taking any valuables with you when leaving the vehicle unattended.

Do You Know A Community Hero?

Roger Hirst, the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner witnessed the efforts of the nominees and their work, for Essex wants to hear about your community **heroes** – people from across Essex who make an 'Outstanding Contribution to Community Safety'. Do you know somebody in your community who goes the extra mile to support vulnerable people, prevent crime and make their communities safer? If so then why not nominate them for the award. The process is simple to complete, and winners will be recognised at the PFCC Annual Conference on Thursday, March 15th March 2018 which is being held at Boreham House in Chelmsford.

The winner will receive £500 to go towards their work in the community and two highly commended winners will also receive £300. There will also be a chance for the people of Essex to vote for the winner of a People's Choice category from a shortlist of entrants selected by a judging panel. The People's Choice winner will receive £100.

To win an award, you have to demonstrate that the nominee is an exceptional person or group that have gone above and beyond to keep their community safe. They also have to have delivered a project or scheme that has improved the safety of those around them. Nominees can be volunteers or those who work in a professional capacity, delivering a service to the public to keep people safe, prevent crime and protect the most vulnerable people in our communities. details of how to nominate are on the Essex PFCC website.

Nominations are open to individuals and teams from across the statuary, community, voluntary and business sectors, where an outstanding contribution has been made to improve community safety, prevent crime or protect vulnerable people. Nominations can submitted by anyone who has benefitted from or including managers, colleagues, or members of the public. Firstly, we are delighted to announce that at our January meeting John Adams was co-opted onto the Council as is now a fully fledged Councillor. Over the past two years, John has taken it upon himself to try and address a number of issues throughout the Parish, and is well known for setting up and managing the Neighbourhood Watch group for both Toot Hill and Stanford Rivers. John has regularly attended Parish Council meetings and already plays an active role in the community, and I am sure you will join us in welcoming him onto the Council.

May we also take this opportunity to apologise to our residents for being unable to hold the Stanford Rivers Christmas Tree Lighting event back in December. The event was scheduled for Sunday 10th December which many of you will recall saw a blanket of snow. Our Chairman, Cllr John Glover, donned his snow boots and gloves so he could place a notice on the green to advise of the cancellation only to find he was in fact snowed in! We hear that the Toot Hill Christmas Tree was spectacular this year and congratulate all those involved in making it a success. (#friendlycompetition)

Issues we have been addressing over the past few months include the continuing saga of the missing finger posts throughout the Parish. Rest assured this issue is as frustrating for us as it is for local residents (let alone the poor visitors who are unable to navigate our rural roads) and we continue to work with the Highway Authority to get this matter resolved. We have also reviewed a

consultation current regarding the proposed implementation of new satellite-based instrument approach procedures at Stapleford Airport who plan to implement new instrument approaches for suitably equipped aircraft landing at the aerodrome. This will in turn have an effect on the approach route taken by aircraft able to use the new approach procedures resulting in them flying directly over Toot Hill. consultation closes on 26th March 2018, and we have asked for further information as to what type of aircraft this will include. A decision as to how to respond to the consultation will be agreed at our next meeting on 8th March. The Parish Council has taken the decision not to increase its precept for the 2018/2019 financial year, meaning that the Parish Council element of the monthly Council Tax paid by a Band D equivalent property is only £4.73. This is in fact a reduction on 2017/2018.


HOW CAN YOU GET INVOLVED?

WHAT WE NEED YOU TO TELL US

Do not place yourself at any risk Remember: Who, What, Where, When, Why and How?

- Who you are (name/ address/ contact details) and.. Who is committing the crime/ acting suspiciously (if known)? Or a description, including any vehicle details and registration number and a direction of travel if they have left
 - What is happening/ happened, what have you actually seen/ heard?
- Where this is occurring and where are you (as detailed as possible including **postcode** or **landmarks**)?
 - When this happened (time if possible or an idea of how long ago)?
- Why this happened? / Why are you suspicious?
- How did it occur? / How was the crime committed?
