Ford RideLondon-Essex Returns To Stanford Rivers

Thanks to grant funding received as part of the Active community, or just for the personal challenge. Essex RideLondon Activation Fund, this is a special bumper edition of News and Views, not only providing you with general information about the Parish, but also including all the information about this Ford RideLondon-Essex, the world's greatest festival of cycling, will return to Stanford Rivers on Sunday 26 May 2024. The event, which is known as the London Marathon on wheels and is organised by London Marathon Events, sees around 25,000 cyclists of all abilities, taking on the personal challenge of riding either 100, 60 or 30 miles. The planned route is the same as the past two editions of the event, starting and finishing in London and passing Epping, North Weald, Ongar, Fyfield, Leaden Roding, Great Dunmow, Felsted, Great Waltham, the Melbourne Park area of Chelmsford and Writtle. While some road closures are necessary to ensure everyone is safe, not all areas will be impacted for more than 12 hours. Provision is in place so that healthcare, emergency services, businesses communities can operate as required. Residents and communities across the event, are invited to be part of Ford RideLondon-Essex. Whether that is raising funds for your community by creating a tempting pit-stop for riders where they can buy food and drink or by creating a community fun day that runs alongside the event. Maybe you or someone you know would like to take part to raise money for a charity, or for your

The event first came to Essex in 2022 and in the first two years in the county has raised an estimated £5m per year for charities. Hosting the event has also meant Essex has received £1.75 million in grants for projects across the county which inspire and provide opportunities for people to be active. In July, Essex County Council confirmed a three-year agreement to host Ford RideLondon-Essex until 2026. Whilst it was perhaps a bit of a shock to the system to start with, many have now embraced the event bringing deck chairs and refreshments outside their homes to the riders. District Council and PFCC Elections 2nd May 2024

On 2nd May we have both District Council and Police, Fire and Crime Commission elections taking place. Whilst there are no changes to the elected Parish Councillors, this year is a 'special' year regarding the District as there are changes agreed by the Boundary Commission to the warding structure. This means there will be changes as to who will represent you at a District level. Previously, this Parish came under the 'Passingford' ward with one District Councillor – Cllr Heather Brady - representing your views. The new ward, named 'Theydon Bois with Passingford' covers a much greater area (including Theydon Bois as the name suggests), however we will be represented by an additional two district Councillors, meaning we will have three in total.




Implications of the Elections Act 2022

Don't forget the introduction of the Elections Act mean introduced changes to how people vote. The key changes are:

- Electors needing to show an approved form of photo ID at a polling station before voting. This includes such ID as a passport, driving licence or national bus pass. If the ID has expired, it will still be applicable to use provided the photo is still a good likeness. For those voters without a suitable form of ID they can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC) via the Gov.uk website.
- Poll cards are changing. The back of the A4 "card" will list the suitable forms of acceptable ID to show.
- Some additional aids and support will be provided to assist accessibility at polling stations for voters with disabilities.
- Postal applications and some proxy applications can now be completed online for most electors. https://www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote

Little End? Hare Street?

In the previous edition of News and Views, I mentioned that there was a new defibrillator located in the Woodman in Little End, however a local resident (who was also the previous Parish Clerk) advised that this was technically incorrect. Apparently Little End runs from Church Road in a north easterly direction towards Ongar, whilst Hare Street runs from Church Road in a south westerly direction towards Passingford Bridge. This means that the Woodman, and subsequently the Parish Defibrillator, is located in Hare Street and not Little End. Such important historic matters often get lost over the years, and our thanks go to the local resident who was able to ensure we have all the correct info!



What Does Your Council Tax Go Towards

On 20th February, Epping Forest District Council set its Council Tax rates for 24/25. Council Leader Chris Whitbread said 'We do much more than just collect the bins. We have been able to protect some of the most valued discretionary services we provide including our 3 additional police officers to safeguard local residents for at least another year. Highway rangers will continue to clean and maintain our towns, villages and countryside.

While most residents will focus headline the numbers, Council Tax payments retained Forest **Eppina** District bv Council to fund its own services represents less than 8% of the total. Council Tax provides only a fraction of the money needed deliver district services residents value most.' ECC Minerals Waste Plan - Possible Site

Essex County Council is currently consulting on an update to its Waste Minerals Plan. As minerals and waste planning authority for Essex, they must ensure that there are enough minerals for construction to meet the needs of Essex, and to provide sites to meet those needs. The current plan was adopted in 2014 and provides planning policies for minerals development in Essex until 2029. This new review will provide enough mineral sites in the County up to the period 2040. Included as one of the possible mineral extraction sites is a site **A63** (image below) — known as Patch Park — which falls in the territory of Lambourne, Theydon Garnon and Theydon Mount parishes. Neighbouring areas and those upstream and downstream in the River Roding catchment area may also be affected. Site A63 could be expected to yield one million tonnes of aggregate, but 79% of the site is in a flood risk zone 3 and the initial assessment of the site has identified it has a high potential for surface water flooding and a high groundwater flood risk. It is important that local residents respond to this consultation, as if this site is selected it will undoubtedly have an impact not only on traffic along the A113, but changes to the water table. Want Easier Bus Access To Romford?

Stanford Rivers Parish Council has been lobbying for some time to extend the TFL 375 bus service into Ongar. The 375 service travels from Romford Station / Romford Market, Hainault, Collier Row, Stapleford Abbots, and currently stops at Passingford Bridge, however we believe that by extending this service to Ongar, it will enable many more residents of Ongar, Toot Hill and Stanford Rivers to make use of the facility. Currently, there is a sustainable transport gap between Ongar and Passingford Bridge, with no bus service provided to our residents. We would really like to hear from you if you would use this bus service, and if you feel there is a need for it. Stanford Rivers Parish Council News

Your local Parish Councillors continue to work on your behalf, representing your views on issues of local importance. In January of this year, the 24/25 budget was set, with a number of exciting projects coming soon. We were delighted to be awarded £15,000 via the UK Shared Prosperity Fund to be used towards green, energy efficient infrastructure for Toot Hill Village Hall. We hope to be able to place solar panels on the roof of the hall, doing our bit to reduce our carbon footprint and making the hall more efficient and cheaper to run. There's quite some work to do, and a further £20,000 of funding needs to be secured to move forward with this project. Watch this space! We also hope to install CCTV at the hall, given its very secluded and hidden location. We will continue to maintain the Parish owned open spaces, along with the phone box at Sharps Green, and the Vehicle Activated Speeding signs along the A113. Community Speedwatch team remain active, and Cllr Adams continues to spearhead the Neighbourhood Watch activity. We continue to monitor flooding, especially along the A113 near Traceys Farm and at Bridge Farm, and are working with the relevant authorities to try and get some action. delighted to have a stand at what was a very wet Toot Hill Show last year (picture below), and plan to continue to support this very worthwhile event. We continue to respond to planning applications, lobby

our District and County Councillors, and ensure you are represented. We were particularly disappointed to learn late last year that the Demand Responsive Transport service (DaRT) that runs from Toot Hill to Epping would no longer be supported by Essex County Council, and the service has been withdrawn. The reason given was that the service was very rarely used, and as such no longer cost effective to run. This leaves the entire parish of Stanford Rivers without any form of public transport. Stanford Rivers Neighbourhood Watch







As the co-ordinator for our parish Neighbourhood Watch scheme, I monitor weekly police reports for the area and it is pleasing to note that overall we have very low crime rates. On the few occasions where something does crop up I will post anything significant on our Facebook and WhatsApp Groups for everyone's information and awareness. If you're not already a member of these groups you can request to join, on Facebook do this directly by looking for the group "Stanford Rivers Neighbourhood Watch". To join the WhatsApp group contact me on WhatsApp through my mobile number 07949 922516.

One area of crime that appears most frequently is vehicle theft, favourites being 4WD Land Rover and similar types, I also hear that any newish Mercedes are in vogue these days. Any work vehicles, especially with the possibility of tools inside do get targeted as well. From the reports I see it seems to me that thieves are literally able to simply walk up to a vehicle, get inside and drive it away. Police advice suggests that key fob cloning is the major culprit so here are a few tips to help minimise the risk of this.

- 1. Keep your key fob in a protective Faraday pouch.
- Obviously don't leave keys on view or hanging up near any access points like doors, windows or letter boxes.
- 3. Be aware that your fobs can be cloned just by being close to it so be wary when you are out and about.
- 4. It might be possible for key fobs to be disabled, I know of one local dealership that has offered to do this free of charge in an endeavour to protect their customers from having their vehicles stolen. Worth considering, check it out with your dealership or manufacturer if your concerned.

Also a word of warning, if you do see something suspicious, a lot of criminals are not averse to adding assault to their offences so it is not recommended to challenge such people directly.

Toot Hill Windmill

In January, a letter was received by a local resident from a lady called Mrs Juliet Betts who came across an old print cutting she found in a dismantled Victorian scrap book of Toot Hill Windmill. The cutting is over 200 years old! The windmill was built in 1824, but was struck by lightning five years later and the miller was seriously injured. On Thursday 18th June 1829, a terrible thunderstorm raged over the area of Ongar and Stanford Rivers. As the thunder clouds hovered over Toot Hill windmill there was a hissing noise and sound like artillery and then the smell of sulphur. Mrs Rayne, the millers wife, was in her cottage when she heard the shrieks of her husband in the mill. She rushed outside to see the mill had been struck by lightning. Mrs Rayners nephew and others came to the rescue and the miller was found on the second floor of the mill. His hair was singed, he had facial injuries and his right leg was almost severed. Mr Potter, the Ongar surgeon, was called for and quickly arrived. He immediately amputated the leg. It appears that the miller survived the ordeal and a lithograph of the millers destruction was sold locally to raise funds for the miller and his family as, no doubt, he was unable to work. As for the mill, it had been struck on the sails cutting two of them off. The lightning then entered the mill demolishing the interior, thrusting two halfhundred weights out through the side of the mill. The roof was blown off, as was the weather boarding on its sides. It was left like a skeleton with its machinery exposed. The mill was repaired and operated until about 1900. It was demolished in 1935.

Shonks Mill Flood Storage Area - Update

Many of you will recall that approval has been given for the creation of a new Flood Storage Area near Shonks Mill. The Environment Agency (EA) recently issued and update on progress with what is known as 'The River Roding Project', which aims to reduce flooding to homes, businesses and infrastructure in the Woodford and Ilford areas. This has obviously been quite contentious for residents in Stanford Rivers, as we receive no benefit whatsoever from the project. The update from the EA is as follows: Current Progress

The project has received planning permission to build a flood storage area upstream of the M25. The business case has received sign-off and we will begin construction in spring 2024. We expect to complete construction during 2026.

6-month project programme look ahead We have recently published a set of frequently asked questions on our webpage which will be kept updated throughout construction. Future project updates will be provided on our information page, but the info graphic to the right shows a summary of the outline for works over the coming months.



We are working closely with Essex Police, the Metropolitan Police, City of London Police and other organisations to ensure we have a range of measures in place to help keep everyone safe and secure.



Major roads and routes

There will be delays to road journeys in parts of Essex on Sunday 26 May, so please plan ahead.

Open as usual

The M11, M25, A12, A120, A130 and A131 are open as usual in Essex on Sunday 26 May.

Closure of cross-county roads

The part-closure of three crosscounty roads – the A414, A1060 and Essex Regiment Way (B1008) – will be required on Sunday 26 May. Full details are provided below to help you plan your journeys.

A414

The A414 will be closed between junction seven of the M11 to the A414 London Road in Chelmsford from 05:00 to 17:00 on Sunday 26 May.

A local access plan for Chipping Ongar is available online.

A1060

On Sunday 26 May, the A1060 will be closed in both directions at Leaden Roding and between Writtle and Chelmsford from 07:00.

The A1060 will reopen at Leaden Roding only, in a westbound direction, at 13:30 for access towards Hatfield Heath and the M11. The A1060 will fully reopen at 15:30.

How do I cross the route?

Stewards and volunteers will provide assistance during the event and help you cross the route wherever possible. If you require assistance that is not a 999 emergency during the event, please ask event staff.

Vehicle crossing points

There will be about 30 available on the Ford RideLondon-Essex route on Sunday 26 May, allowing drivers to cross the route safely. Locations of the vehicle crossing points in your area are displayed on the map as black dots.

Pedestrian crossing points

These are located along the event route and will be supervised to help you cross the road. Usual crossings may be suspended, but an alternative will be available where it will be easier to cross. Please be patient during the event and listen to stewards' instructions.

Will carer visits and hospital appointments go ahead?

Provision is in place for care providers to make home visits as planned, and all local hospitals will be accessible throughout the event. If you have any queries or need assistance to plan care or hospital visits, please contact our dedicated Customer Services Team

I need essential access in or out of the road – how do I do that?
